
WEEK OF PRAYER 13 - 19 MARCH 2021

TO MARK THE BEGINNING OF POPE FRANCIS' 'AMORIS LAETITIA FAMILY YEAR'



On 19 March 2021, the Church will celebrate five years since the publication of Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation Amoris Laetitia (The Joy of Love) on the beauty and joy of love in the family. On that day, Pope Francis will launch a year dedicated to the family which will conclude on 26 June 2022 on the occasion of the Tenth World Meeting of Families in Rome.

Bishops have welcomed the Holy Father's 'Amoris Laetitia Family Year' and will mark its beginning with a Week of Prayer from 13 March to 19 March (the Feast of Saint Joseph). This resource is offered by the Bishops' Council for Marriage and the Family to assist families to participate in the Week of Prayer.

This resource comprises a page for each day of the Week of Prayer which can be easily followed in parish, school and at home. Each day has a theme reflecting on family life through the lens of Saint Joseph, whom we are also celebrating as part of the family year. The resource has at its centre the prayer from Pope Francis which he wrote for the Year of St Joseph and some inspiring reflections from '*The Joy of Love*' (*Amoris Laetitia*).

Saturday 13 March: Saint Joseph – the Man of Faith

Today we begin a **Week of Prayer** as we prepare to celebrate a special year which Pope Francis has dedicated to the 'The Joy of Love' in family life. The year will begin on the Feast of Saint Joseph on 19 March. We have chosen Saint Joseph as our inspiration for our Week of Prayer.

Our reflection today is on Saint Joseph as a man of faith. We pray for all families in our parish: that they will feel nurtured by the coming year, especially when it comes to passing on the faith from one generation to the next.

In order for faith to continue through the generations of a family, there must be a passing down of that faith. The role of parents is to pass down the faith to their children who will in turn pass it down to their children and so faith can thrive from generation to generation. We read a great example of this in Scripture:

"I am reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also." (2 Timothy 1:5)

In this passage, we see faith was passed down through three generations. Lois the grandmother, Eunice the mother and Timothy the son.

The love of a father for his children and his wife is captured beautifully in the life of St. Joseph. Even though he is mentioned a number of times in the Gospel accounts of Matthew and Luke, no words of his are recorded. What mattered was that Joseph was there, present to Mary and Jesus, always ready to listen, to encourage, to protect, to provide and to love.

In the well know piece of Scripture from Corinthians we read: "Now faith, hope, and love remain - these three things - and the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:13)

The greatest love of all is expressed in families throughout our parish day after day, and more than ever during the Covid-19 pandemic.

So much of the work that takes place in family life is under the radar: we think of the parents and grandparents working to better the lives of their children; the work of family carers that is 24/7. We think too at this time of those who have lost their livelihoods as a result of the pandemic.

May the favour of the Lord our God rest on us; establish the work of our hands for us - yes, establish the work of our hands... (Psalm 90:17)

May God Bless the work of our hands and make us always strive for a good work/life balance.

As we conclude our **Week of Prayer**, we ask for God's protection for all families through the intercession of Saint Joseph. We pray his **Memorare**:

Remember, O most pure spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, my great protector, Saint Joseph, that no one ever had recourse to your protection, or implored your aid without obtaining relief. Confiding therefore in your goodness, I come before you. Do not turn down my petitions, foster father of the Redeemer, but graciously receive them. Amen.

I offer you a final reflection from Pope' Francis on the family: "The spirituality of family love is made up of thousands of small but real gestures. In that variety of gifts and encounters which deepen communion, God has his dwelling place." (*Amoris Laetitia*, **315**)
